### 5. How does Psalm 91 describe God's protection, and how can we see a similar message in Matthew 6:25-34?

He reassures them that just as God provides for the birds and flowers, He will also take care of them, underscoring the **importance of seeking** God's kingdom first.

Both passages convey a profound sense of reliance on God's protection and provision, encouraging believers to trust Him completely in all circumstances.

### 6. What does Psalm 91 say about deliverance, and how does this connect with 2 Timothy 4:18?

Psalm 91 speaks profoundly about deliverance, emphasizing God as a refuge and fortress. It assures believers that when they trust in Him, they will be protected from dangers, such as deadly pestilence and harmful forces. Verses like "He will rescue you from the snare of the fowler" highlight **God's promise to deliver those** who seek Him.

In 2 Timothy 4:18, Paul writes about his confidence that the Lord will deliver him from every evil attack and bring him safely to His heavenly kingdom. This verse echoes the theme of divine protection found in Psalm 91. Both passages underscore the idea that trust in God leads to safety and deliverance, whether in the face of physical dangers or spiritual trials.

Together, they reinforce the assurance that God is committed to safeguarding His followers in both earthly challenges and ultimate spiritual fulfillment.

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### 7. In what ways does Psalm 91's assurance of peace and safety compare to John 14:27?

Psalm 91 and John 14:27 both convey profound messages of peace and safety, but they approach these themes from different perspectives.

**Psalm 91** emphasizes God's protection and refuge. It speaks of deliverance from dangers, describing how those who trust in God will find safety under His wings. The imagery suggests a strong, protective presence, reassuring believers that they are shielded from harm.

**John 14:27**, on the other hand, presents a more personal peace offered by Jesus. He says, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you." This peace is not just the absence of trouble but a deep, abiding sense of calm that transcends circumstances. It's a peace rooted in faith in Christ and His presence.

In Psalm 91, the psalmist expresses a deep assurance in God's protection and faithfulness, calling believers to take refuge in Him. The imagery used—like being sheltered under His wings—evokes a sense of safety and comfort that comes from trusting in God's promises.

Hebrews 11:1 defines faith as "the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." This verse captures the essence of faith as not just a feeling, but a confident trust in God's character and His unseen promises.

Together, these passages highlight that true faith involves both a deep trust in God's protective nature (as seen in Psalm 91) and a confident expectation of His promises (as articulated in Hebrews 11:1).
